President's Report 2014-2015 Rick Karp

The foundation of The Whitehorse Chamber of Commerce is our membership and our volunteer Board. We are here to serve our members and to provide the results you have come to expect. I am proud of our accomplishments this past year and the dedicated volunteers that occupy positions on our Board of Directors. This year has been an adventure to say the least.

During the 2014/2015-year we offered programs supported the Department of Economic Development and we thank them for their continued acknowledgement of the value we offer to our membership. We also partnered with other departments, agencies, and governments to ad value to our membership: for example we have partnered with the City of Whitehorse, many businesses in Whitehorse, Challenge – Disability Resource Group, YuWIN, YTEC (Yukon Tourism Education Council), the Yukon Chamber of Commerce, the Department of Highways and Public Works, the Department of Justice, and the Department of Education, to name a few.

The value of the Chamber is often measured by answering the question – "What does the Chamber do for me"? The answer would take a lot more space than I have, but below is a partial answer to that question.

- We have intervened on behalf of business on policy issues such as Affordable Housing, the changes to the Liquor Act to allow for wholesale prices to hotels and restaurants, the Landlord Tennant Act, The Condominium Act, The Land Titles Modernization Program, the development of the 3 hectare property at 5Th and Rogers, helping to organize business to business meetings to give Yukon Businesses a chance to benefit from the many projects such as the new Whitehorse Hospital Expansion project and the Extended Care Facility going into Whistle Bend, the process of contracting, procurement, RFP's in Government, Labour Market issues and making Whitehorse more business friendly.
- During the year we have assisted many businesses in dealing with Labour Standards issues, how to start a new business, CRA, immigration and other business issues.
- Our Business After Hours and networking opportunities
- Our Chamber Benefits Program for you and your employees
- Reduced Debit, Visa, and MasterCard rates
- Affordable, effective advertising for your business
- Training and Development seminars and workshops
- Bi-weekly Bulletin to keep you informed and up-to-date on what is happening
- E blasts to share business opportunities, notices and events
- Our Highway Signs Program
- The Planter Box Program (a partnership with Challenge and the City of Whitehorse)
- Acting as a Liaison between Business and all levels of Government
- Our referral programs and our Buy Local Policy
- And our Business Connect Conference

The programs that we offer our membership are making a significant contribution to business in Yukon. Partnering for Success Program has dealt with the new Procurement Office at YG and the issues around the writing of RFP's and contracting and investigating the need for a Trespass Act in Yukon. We have been successful in working with Yukon College to get the SCMA (Supply Chain Management Association) course to be offered at the College starting in the fall of 2015. This is a two-year course and offers accreditation in supply chain management, which opens a whole new window of opportunity in Yukon. During the past year we have hosted and participated in Round Tables for the CRA on Red Tape Reduction, the CMHC on Housing, monthly Community Policing Meetings, the City's Waste Management Initiatives, Building Consolidation and we came second to YG in the City's Cleanup Challenge beating the City handily. We partnered with YTEC on the Golden Host program and awards banquet. We hosted the Ambassador from the U.S and several Consul Generals.

We participated in the creation of the new Economic Development Strategy for the City. The Chamber continues to have representation on the Finance Committee, which was created by the City last year. We have made several presentations to City Council on behalf of Whitehorse businesses. We have worked with the City on issues such as Waste Management, Parking, Snow removal, their budgeting process and the new Building Consolidation Plans. Finally, we look forward to working closely with the City on projects in the coming year.

Every day we respond to questions about Whitehorse, questions and visits from government people at all levels of Government, and requests to have brochures sent to places all over North America. We refer clients to businesses and business-to-business as well as referring enquiries from outside of Yukon to local businesses.

Many times during a week or month we will have people just drop in, call or e-mail asking about starting a business, our economy, moving to Whitehorse, seeking information on labour standards or Human Rights issues and programs such as the Foreign Worker Program. We offer support and referral services to our members.
