

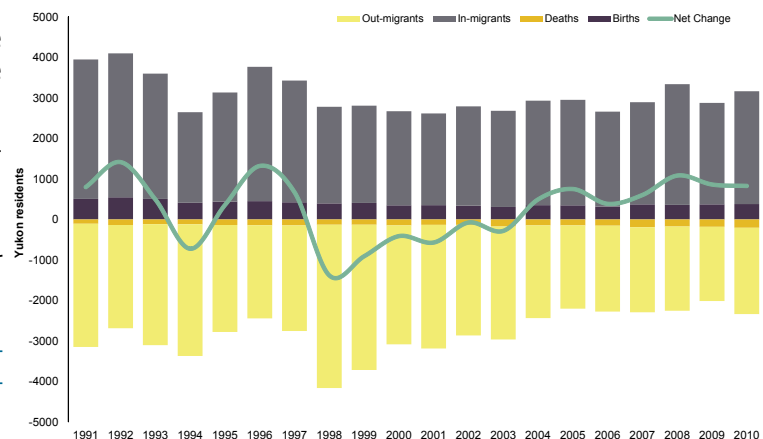
Highlights:

- Since the second quarter of 2010, close to the same number of people have come to Yukon as have left: Yukon experienced a net gain of 2 people.
- The April Community Spatial Price Index showed Teslin prices at 6.9% higher than Whitehorse prices, making Teslin prices closest to Whitehorse prices.
- In June, Whitehorse median rent went up to \$785 with a vacancy rate of 1.2%.

New this month: Yukon Migration Patterns 2010

- From June '09 to June '10 Yukon's population increased by 2.4%.
- The population grew because of a positive net migration of 652 and natural increase of 174 people.
- The majority of migration to, from, and within Yukon happens between Whitehorse and another area.
- A high percentage of population turnover happens in Yukoners between ages 25 and 35.

From June 2010 to June 2011, Yukon saw an average of 32 births, 14 deaths and 11 marriages per month.

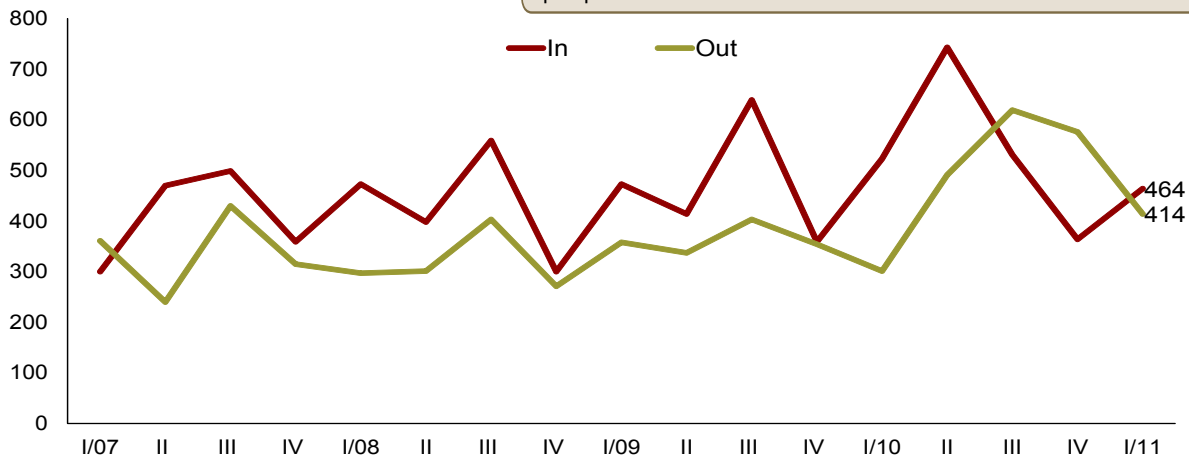

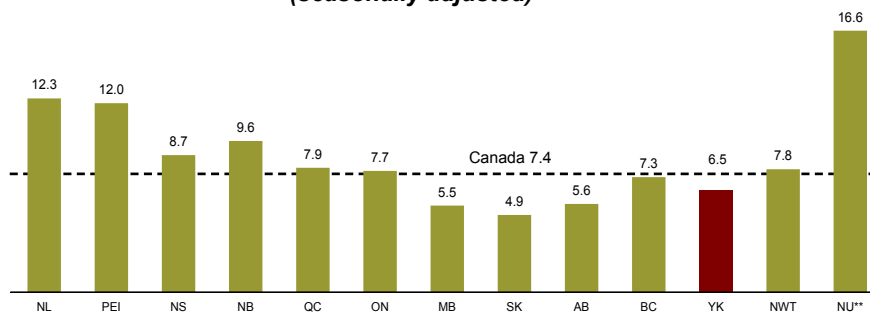

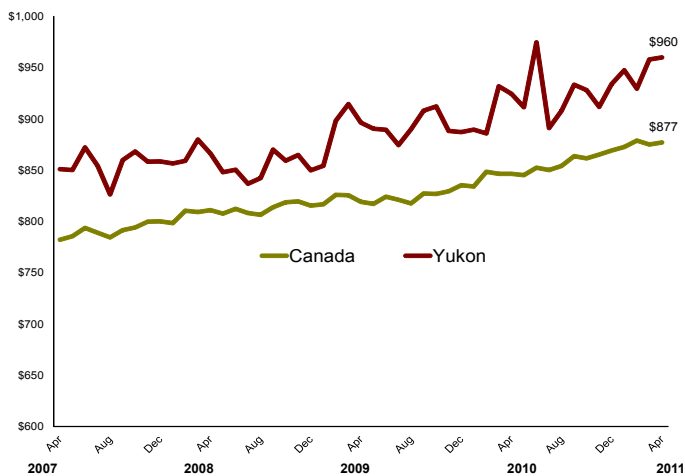

Preliminary figures for April 2011 show average weekly earnings were \$959.76 in Yukon. Compared to April 2010, the Transportation and warehousing sector saw the highest percentage increase in average weekly earnings, increasing \$155.55, or 18.0%.

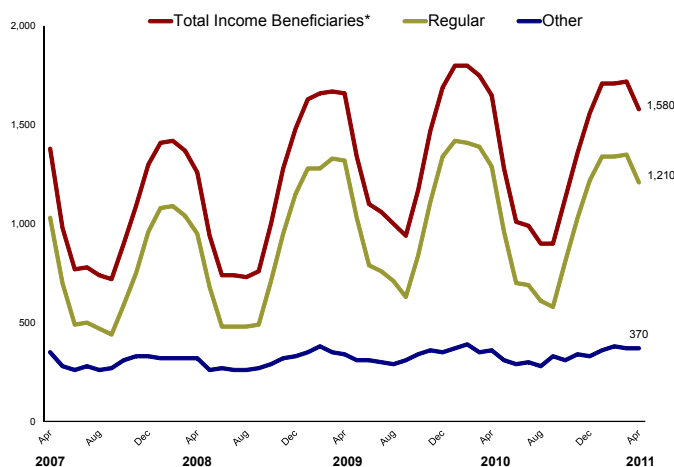
Year to date, from January to April 2011, annual average weekly earnings in Yukon were \$948.76. The service sector employed the largest number of workers in Yukon, and the goods producing industry had the highest earnings (\$1,132.27).

Major **monthly** increases were seen in the following CPI commodities:

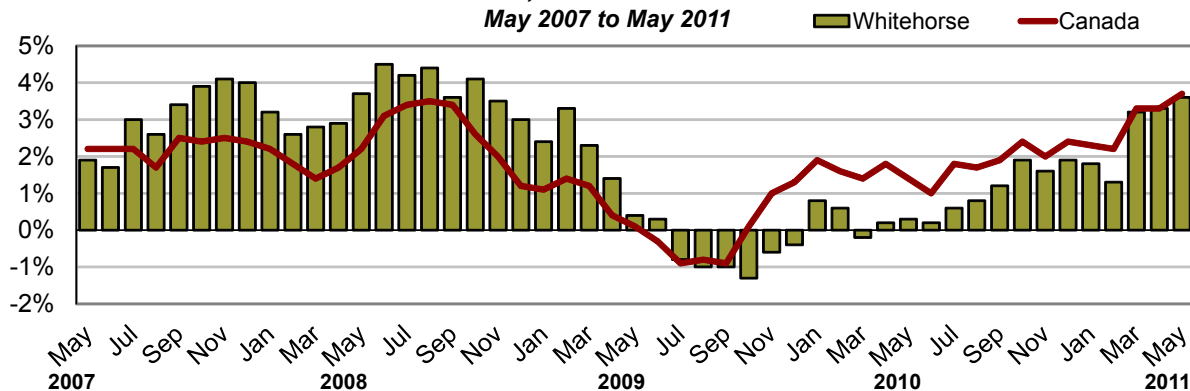

3.3 Selected Price Indices, May 2011

Comparing the month of May 2011 with May 2010, the **annual** rate of inflation in Whitehorse (3.6%) was 0.1% lower than the annual rate of inflation in Canada.

Annual increases for Whitehorse in May were seen in:

- Gasoline
- Fuel oil and other fuels
- Homeowners' home and mortgage insurance

Offsetting some of these **annual** increases were decreases in:

- Women's clothing
- Footwear
- Preserved fruit and fruit preparation

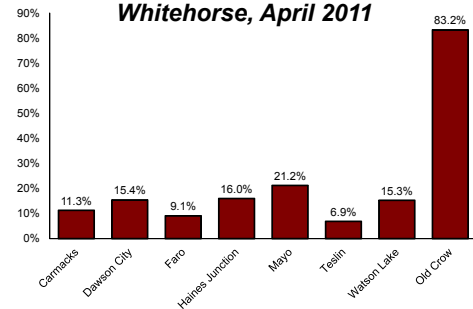

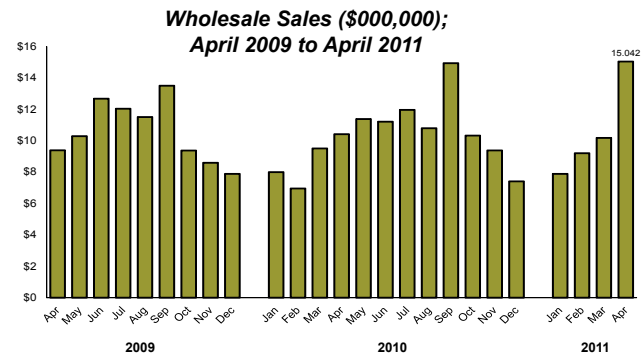
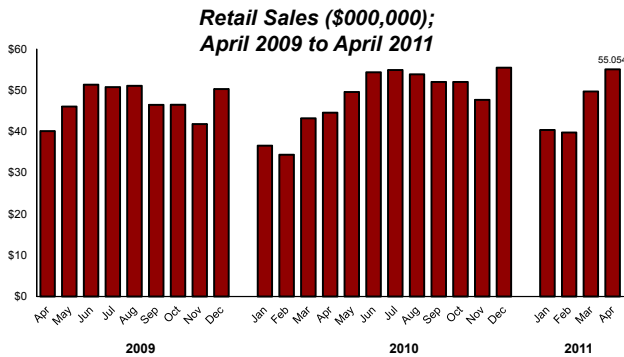

4.1 Retail and Wholesale Sales

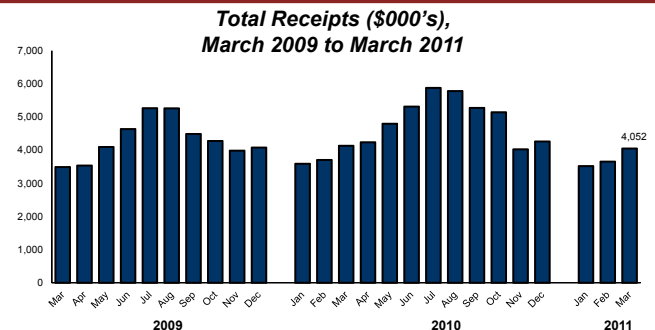

In April 2011, retail sales totalled \$55,054,000 in Yukon, an increase of \$10,509,000 or 23.6% compared to April 2010. Year to date from January to April, Yukon retail sales increased 16.5% from 2010 while Canada sales increased 2.9%.

Yukon wholesale sales totalled \$15,042,000 in April 2011. This is an increase of \$4,634,000 or 44.5% compared to April 2010. Year to date from January to April, Yukon wholesale sales increased 21.4% from 2010 while Canada-wide sales went up 6.0%.

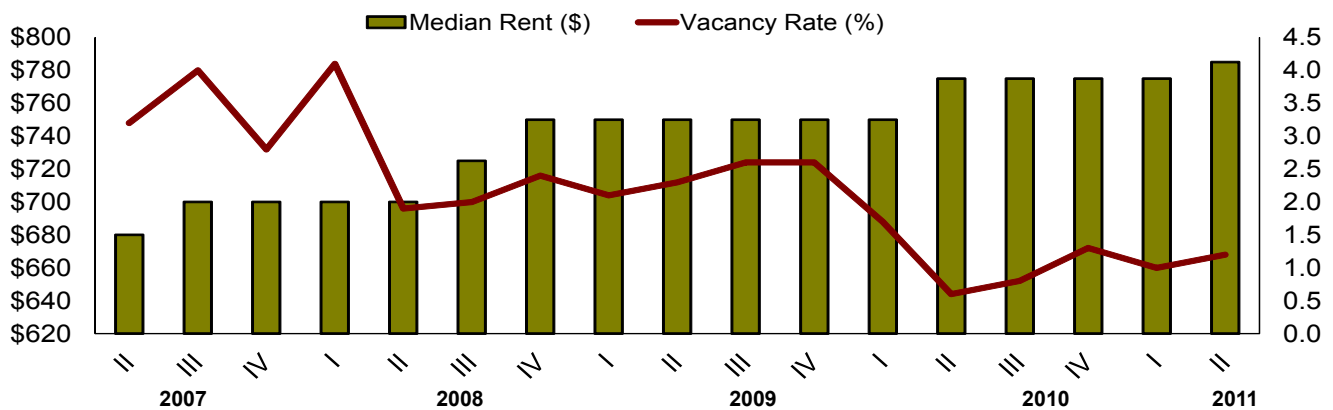
Did you know?

The past year has seen high median rent prices and record low vacancy rates across Yukon. The Q2 2010 vacancy rate of 0.6% in Whitehorse was the lowest recorded since the third quarter of 1988. In the past 5 years, the median rent has increased 15.4% in Whitehorse, 14.8% in Watson Lake, and 4.0% in Dawson City.

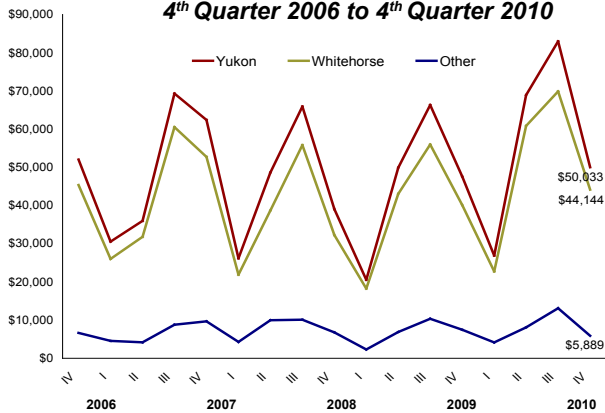

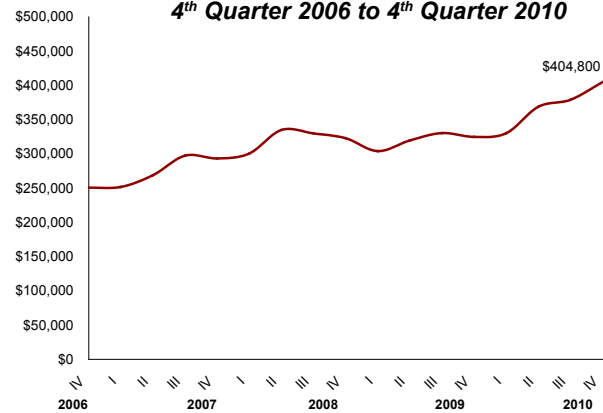

4th Quarter 2006 to 4th Quarter 2010**



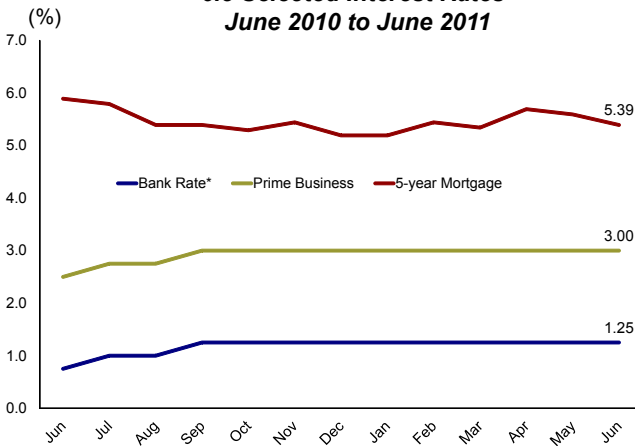

In 2010, real estate transactions in Yukon totalled \$50,032,500, an increase of \$2,423,000 or 5.1%. In Whitehorse, real estate transactions totalled \$44,144,000, an increase of \$4,014,300, or 10.0%. In areas outside of Whitehorse, real estate transactions totalled \$5,888,500, a decrease of \$1,591,400, or 21.3%.

The average selling price for a single house in Whitehorse reached record high levels, increasing \$80,000, or 24.6%, from the fourth quarter '09 (\$324,800) to the fourth quarter '10 (\$404,800).

In June 2011, both the bank rate and prime business rate remained steady for the tenth month in a row, at 1.25% and 3.00% respectively, while the 5-Year Mortgage Rate decreased to 5.39%.

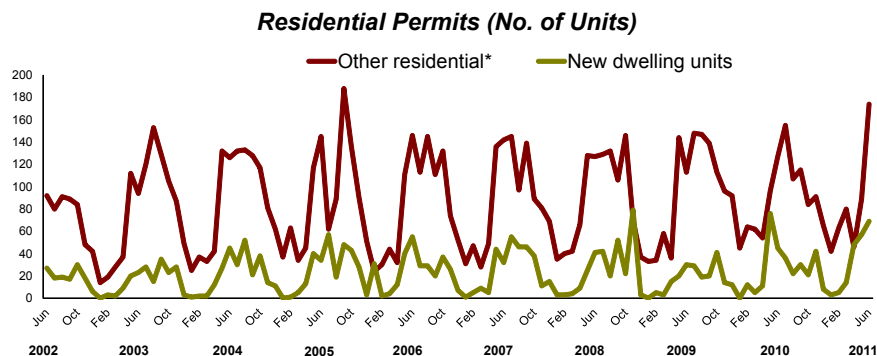
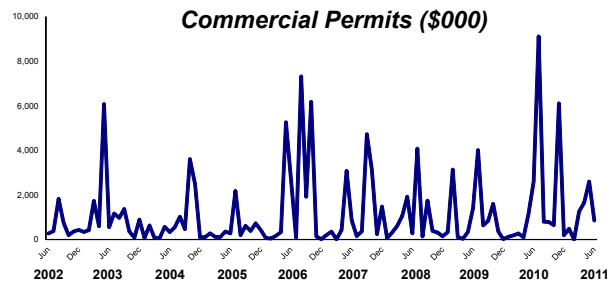
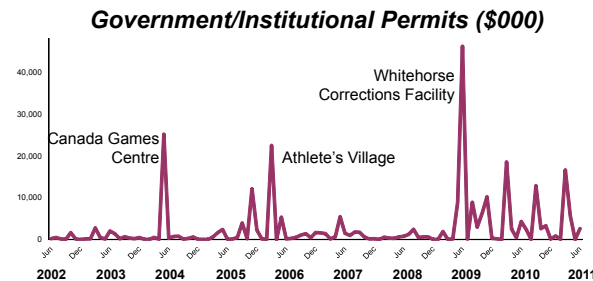
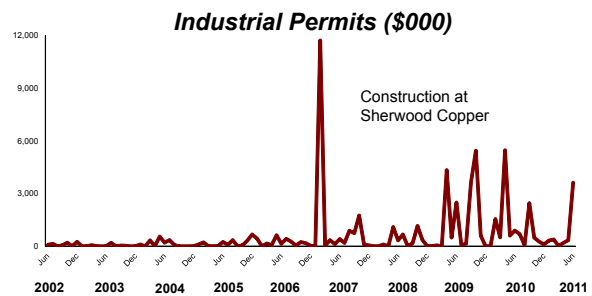
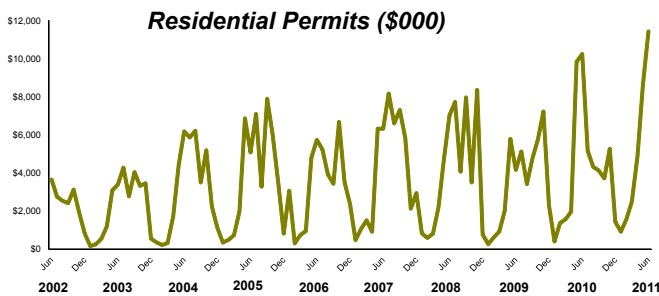
- 61.8% of the value was in residential permits

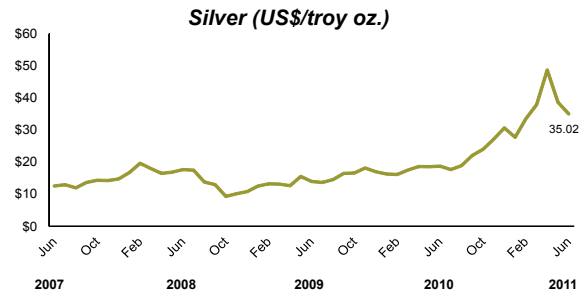
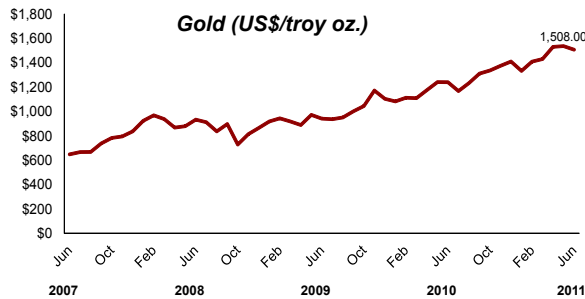
7.2 Value of Building Permits, June 2002 to June 2011

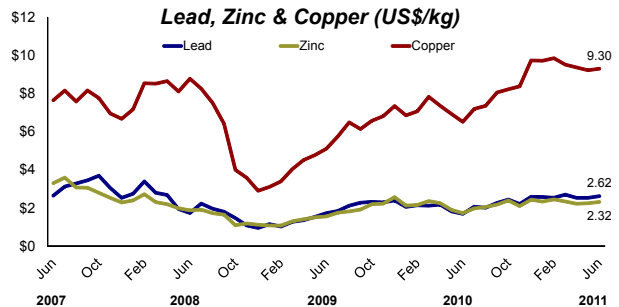

8.1 London Metal Commodity Prices, June 2007 to June 2011



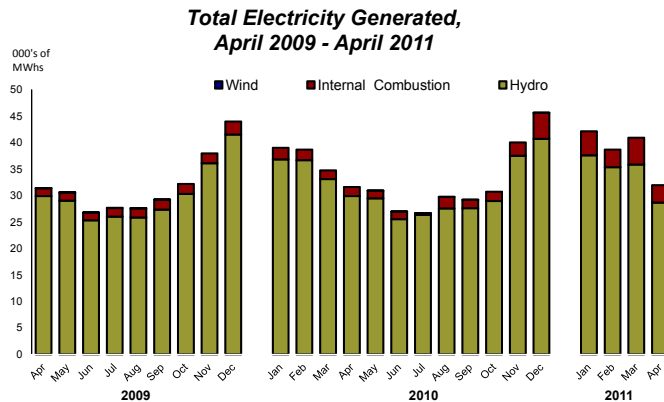
From June 2010 to June 2011:

Year to date, from January to April 2011, there were 10,603 flights in Whitehorse, an increase of flights 2,500 or 30.9% compared to the same time period in 2010. In the communities, Faro saw the largest increase in flights from January 2011 to April 2011, up 427.3% or 564 flights. Beaver Creek saw the largest decrease, down 75.0% or 180 flights, from January 2011 to April 2011.

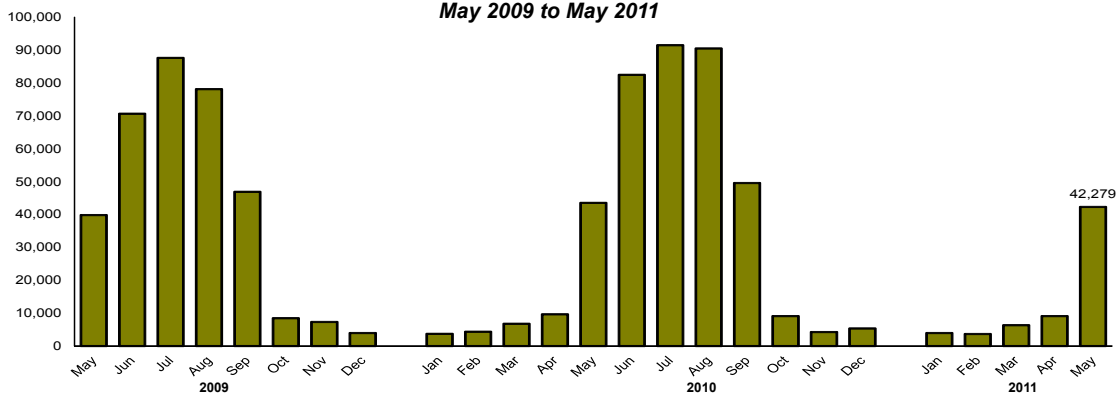

Endnotes

1. Population

- 1.1 & 1.2 Due to the use of regression modelling, the sums of rows and/or columns may not equal totals given. In addition, population estimates do not include approximately 200 RCMP and military personnel living in Yukon who do not subscribe to the Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan.
- 1.2 'Other' includes communities such as Champagne, Elsa, Johnson's Crossing, Keno City, Stewart Crossing & Swift River.
- 1.4 Migration estimates are based on both international and interprovincial movement into and out of Yukon, as well as returning emigrants, temporary emigrants and non-permanent residents.

2. Employment

- 2.1 Yukon figures are rounded to the nearest hundred; because of this, figures may not sum to totals. All Yukon figures from the Labour Force Survey are three-month moving averages based on 92% coverage.
- 2.2 Yukon and Northwest Territories are not included in the Canadian unemployment rate.
- 2.3 "Total" government employment includes Yukon Liquor Corp. and Yukon Development Corp./Yukon Energy Corp.; excluded are First Nation governments. "Territorial General" government employment includes employees of all Yukon Government departments, as well as employees of Yukon Workers' Compensation Health & Safety Board, Yukon College, etc. "Territorial Health & Social Services" includes employees at Whitehorse General Hospital, Alexander MacDonald Lodge, Children's Receiving Home and Assessment, Detoxification Centre, group homes, Norman D. Macaulay Lodge, Northern Network of Services, Copper Ridge Place and the Thomson Centre.
- 2.4 & 2.5 Unclassified employees are excluded, as well as those enterprises primarily involved in agriculture, fishing and trapping, private household services, religious organizations, and military personnel of defense services. Additional employee and earnings data for other NAICS (North American Industrial Classification System) categories are available by contacting Yukon Bureau of Statistics.
- 2.6 & 2.7 Employment insurance income beneficiaries include regular, sickness, maternity, parental, training and other types of benefits, but exclude those receiving employment and support measures benefits. "Other" in graph includes beneficiaries from other communities than those displayed, as well as beneficiaries whose community could not be determined. A value of "0" represents one of the following: 1) value is actually zero; 2) value may be rounded to zero; or 3) value is more than zero but is suppressed for confidentiality reasons.

3. Consumer Prices

- 3.1 & 3.2 The Consumer Price Index (CPI) measures price changes over time but should not be used to compare costs between provinces and cities. As of the May 2007 CPI release, the weights of various items in the basket of goods and services used to calculate the index have been updated from 2001 to 2005.

5. Rental Units

- 5.1, 5.2 & 5.3 The Yukon Rental Survey covers buildings with four or more units. Rentals with less than four units (such as houses, suites and duplexes) are not included in the survey.

6. Real Estate

- 6.3 Bank Rate figures are from the last Wednesday of the month.
- 6.4 The 'Family Lots' category does not include the majority of lots purchased by contractors. For further explanation, contact Yukon Bureau of Statistics.

7. Construction

- 7.1 Rounded data may not sum to totals. Permits issued in the communities are totalled on a calendar month.

8. Resources

- 8.1 All prices are in US dollars. Prices of gold and silver are a.m. fix prices at month-end. Prices of lead, zinc and copper are London Metal Exchange "cash seller" prices at month-end.
- 8.3 'Total' includes other types of refined petroleum product sales. Domestic sales are by reporting companies, are exclusive of exports and sales to other reporting companies, and are adjusted for exports and imports by non-reporting companies. 'Aviation gasoline' includes all gasoline-type fuels for piston-type aircraft engines.

9. Transportation

- 9.2 This table only includes persons entering Yukon by land at Canada Border Service Agency points of entry. Travellers entering Yukon through all other roadways are excluded, as are persons entering by air and water. *Please note:* Fraser BC border crossings are included in totals even though there is the possibility that these persons may never physically enter Yukon.
